CAST BIOGRAPHIES

Alyson Leah

Being a part of *Godspell* is very exciting for Alyson as it is her first theatre gig out of school! However, acting has always been a passion of hers. Before attending Bishop's University she attended St. Georges High School and John Abbott College and received the opportunity to play many comedic/character roles, such as Yente the Matchmaker in "Fiddler on the Roof" (at 13 years old), Miss Adelaide in "Guys and Dolls" (at 16), Professor Kokintz, which was originally written as a male role, in "The Mouse That Roared" (at 18) and her absolute favorite, Princess Puffer, an opium den owner with 5 inch nails, in "The Mystery of Edwin Drood." She also started doing voice work at ten years old, when, after doing a two-line part on "Caillou" was cast as three-year-old Vicita on "Arthur." She can also do many silly people tricks such as wiggling her ears and touching her nose with her tongue and is terrified of fish and other sea creatures.

Dane Stewart (Jesus)

Dane hails from the Maritimes where he spent his childhood learning how to be nice to everyone. Most nights when he's locking his door, he misses the land where he could leave his door unlocked without worry of being robbed/catnapped. He is currently finishing his degree at McGill where he spends half his time studying theatre and the other half playing percussion. He spends his free time helping run McGill's Players' Theatre and running around the city to help out the band Motel Raphael with his vibraphone experience. The only person who inspires Dane more than himself, is the co-star of Brokeback Mountain: Jake Gyllenhaal, with whom Dane shares an unsettling obsession (alongside the entire global gay community). Dane is fearfully excited to be a part of this production.

Elizabeth Conway (John/Judas)

Elizabeth Conway spent half of her life in Hershey, Pennsylvania and Bronxville, New York, and is thrilled to cap off her last year of her four year stay in Montreal with this creatively tickling production of Godspell. Elizabeth will be playing the role of John the Baptist/Judas, and is excited to explore the gender bending creation that comes with this dynamic role. Some of her other favorite, most challenging parts include Yitzhak in Hedwig and the Angry Inch, a third of the Warden in Kiss of the Spider Woman, a third of the Daughter in A Dream Play, and all three girlfriends in Company. (Perhaps three should be her lucky number.) Elizabeth has studied clowning and mask with Prof. Myrna Wyatt Selkirk at McGill University, and has a certificate in acting from the Stella Adler Summer Conservatory in New York. She appeared alongside Karen Allen of "Indiana Jones" fame in the 2002 short film "Smallroom Dancing," directed by Sports Illustrated photographer Neil Leifer. Elizabeth has studied tap, jazz, and ballroom dancing, and was the 2008 winner of the NATS Allegheny Region Musical Theatre Voice Competition. Recently, Elizabeth originated the principle role in the award winning musical "21 Days" at the 2012 Toronto Fringe Festival. Most importantly, however Elizabeth received the highly coveted "Punniest Thespian Award" at McGill University. Elizabeth used to be an avid recreational fencer.

Elyse Lewis hails from the small New England town of Sharon, Massachusetts. She relocated to Montreal to attend McGill University, where she will complete her BA in Theatre Studies and Women's Studies this December. At McGill, she has studied clowning and mask with Professor Myrna Wyatt Selkirk. Montreal credits include Players' Theatre's *Company* (Susan), McGill

English Department's *A Dream Play* (Billposter, Dean of Law), and V-Day McGill's 2011 *Vagina Monologues* ("They Beat the Girl Out of My Boy"). She also performed in this summer's Toronto Fringe Festival as Cynthia in Bad Dress Production's original musical *21 Days*. Elyse is an active member of Queer McGill, where she held the positions of 2011-2012 Co-Administrator and 2010-2011 Political Action Coordinator. As an amateur burlesque act, Elyse has performed in and hosted Queer McGill's Drag and Burlesque Show. In high school, she was an active member and leader in the Jewish youth organization B'nai Brith Youth Organization.

Emily Skahan

Emily Skahan is a Concordia theatre graduate and a founding member of Montreal Indie pop sensation Motel Raphael. The band includes, among others, *Godspell*'s very own Dane Stewart. When she isn't acting or playing with the band, Emily is a licensed street musician, and if you catch sight of her in the dank bowels of the metro, chances are excellently large that she'd be happy to talk.

Eva Petris

As far back as she can remember Eva has always had a passion for musical theatre. Dancing since 3 years old, she learned the basics of jazz and ballet and excelled in the art of Tap dancing, thanks to the incredible Ethel Bruneau. Eva was also chosen out of hundreds of auditioners, where a select few were able to go to New York City and be taught by some of Broadways brightest as part of Broadway Dance Center's Musical Theatre Performance Project. Most recently Eva was featured in the Dora Wasserman Yiddish Theatre Production of *On Second Avenue* where she had the opportunity to sing and fall in love with the Yiddish language. CREATIVE TEAM BIOGRAPHIES

Natalie Gershtein (*Producer*)

Co-founder and producer of BCT, Natalie Gershtein is currently working towards her M.F.A in Theatre Management & Producing at Columbia University in New York City. Prior to moving to New York, Ms. Gershtein studied theatre and religion at McGill University for four years. Ms. Gershtein is well-known in the Montreal theatre community and has completed internships with Teesri Duniya Theatre and the Segal Centre for Performing Arts. Ms. Gershtein has produced and directed award-winning shows in both Montreal and New York. Her production of *Jump*, which Ms. Gershtein wrote and produced, won the award for Best Play in New York City's Network One-Act Festival (2012). Other Montreal accomplishments include writing and producing *Awakening* in Players' Theatre at McGill University (2012) and co-directing the McGill English Department's main stage production of *A Dream Play* (2012) with Professor Myrna Wyatt Selkirk.

Related to arts management, Ms. Gershtein has received stage manager training through Equity in the *S.M.ing The Arts Conference* (2011). She has stage managed a total of six productions, working at the Dancemakers Studio in Toronto (2008), the Fringe Festival in Montreal (2011) and several McGill University productions. As a part of the Montreal Fringe, she was both the stage manager and the venue manager for an original Turtle of Shoe production (2011). Ms. Gershtein has coupled her management experiences in the theatre by taking on other creative roles, such as dramaturg, playwright and director. She directed seven plays at McGill University, including *Twelve Angry Men* by Reginald Rose, *Ashes to Ashes* by Harold Pinter and *Songs for a New World* by Jason Robert Brown. At McGill, she was able to explore theatre using a theoretical approach, while combining her academic studies in religion. Combining religion and theatre allowed Ms. Gershtein to explore human relationships using history, culture and religion as a means of expression and self-realization. Ms. Gershtein has had a paper published in *Canons: Religious Studies Undergraduate Journal* exploring the implications of Japanese Noh Drama in Mahayana Buddhism, and has also presented her research on Buddhism and dramatic writing at the 2012 Arts Undergraduate Research Conference at McGill University.

In New York, Natalie has worked for 101 Productions, helping to organize the opening nights for such Broadway shows as *Annie* and *The Heiress*. She is currently working for Snug Harbor Productions, and began by assisting with their Off-Broadway opening of *The Vagina Monologues'* playwright and activist Eve Ensler's new play, *Emotional Creature*.

Calli Armstrong (Director)

Co-founder and artistic director of BCT, Calli Armstrong is a theatre practitioner with more than 20 years of experience directing, producing, stage managing, and performing. She has been a director for the Unweeded Garden Theatre Company (2001-2003; Sudbury, Ontario), and has also directed large-scale productions for McMaster University and McGill University. Ms. Armstrong is also a drama therapist (M.A. Creative Arts Therapies, 2007) and a Ph.D. candidate in counselling psychology (McGill University, 2013). In this capacity, Ms. Armstrong has worked with a number of non-profit organizations including the Centre for the Arts and Human Development, which is a creative arts therapies centre for adults with developmental disabilities. She is also the founder of the Drama Club at the Teapot (La Théière), a seniors' 50+centre in Lachine, Québec.

Ms. Armstrong has experience using theatre to benefit the Montreal community: to raise money for charitable organizations, build dialogue, raise awareness, and decrease discrimination. From 2005-2008, Ms. Armstrong was involved in Troupe Becket Players productions on the West Island of Montreal, an organization dedicated to raising funds for children's charities. Ms. Armstrong has also been involved with four different Playback Theatre groups over the past four years, including Montreal Playback Theatre and Third Space Playback. This form of theatre can be used to address conflict and to build empathy, dialogue, and community among individuals and groups.

Ms. Armstrong has vast experience as a leader and scholar. Ms. Armstrong has taught at McGill University, Concordia University, and McMaster University, and has been an invited speaker for training sessions (e.g. playback theatre training for staff at Aulneau Renewal Centre, Winnipeg, Manitoba) and conferences (e.g. National American Drama Therapy Association Conference). She has given and/or authored more than 40 presentations and workshops. Her work has been presented at regional (Association des Art-Thérapeutes du Québec), national (Canadian Psychological Association), and international (International Margaret Cavendish Society) conferences. In 2013, Ms. Armstrong will begin a postdoctoral fellowship in Concordia University's Creative Arts Therapies department.

David Terriault (Musical Director)

A Montreal native, David Terriault is currently studying classical piano at McGill University. Recent credits as a musical director include *Créatures* (CETM), *The Prince and the Pauper* (CETM & Midtown International Theatre Festival), *The Wild Party* (In Your Face Entertainment), *Songs for a New World* (Players' Theatre) and assistant director for *On Second Avenue* (Segal Centre). Before his involvement in musical theatre, David won and participated in several classical music competitions across Quebec such as Canadian Music Competition, Concours de Musique Classique de Sorel-Tracy, Festival de Musique Classique de Montreal and Concours de Musique Classique de Sillery. David is also a choir conductor currently working with *Harmonicoeur* and *Jazz, Pop et Talons Hauts*.

Ghislaine Doté (*Choreographer*)

Originally from the Central African Republic, Ghislaine Doté grew up in Ivory Coast where she learned dancing, singing, and martial arts. After a BA in contemporary dance in Montreal, Ghislaine Doté founded her company, Virtuo Danse, and both choreographs and composes the music of her pieces. Ghislaine is the recipient of several grants and awards for her artistic work. A performer at heart, Ghislaine has danced for several companies and productions: company

Sinha Danse, company Flak, Cirque du Soleil, SYTYCD Canada (2008, Toronto finalist), Just For Laughs, etc. Her love for music and expression has led her to musical theatre. She was part of the cast of *Starmania* (Plamondon/Berger, 2008-2009). She has appeared in the Yiddish production *On Second Avenue* (Segal Center, 2012), she was also in the cast of *The Virgin Courtesan* (DB Clarke Theatre, 2012). Ghislaine is thrilled to be choreographing *Godspell* for Beautiful City Theatre.

Myrna Wyatt Selkirk (Creative Collaborator)

Myrna Wyatt Selkirk is a professor at McGill University, where she teaches acting and directing. Her current passions include clown, mask and physical theatre. During her sabbatical this year she is investigating all three. As part of her collaboration with BCT, she recently led the *Godspell* cast in a series of workshops on clown and play.

Eric Chad (*Technical Director*)

Eric Chad is a fourth year Pharmacology student and would love nothing more than to abandon all science and join the circus (but actually). Hailing from Ottawa, he has been swept up into the theatre community at McGill. After meeting Calli on a production of *Kiss of the Spider Woman*, he is extremely excited to work with her in this exciting new space! Furthermore, he is elated to be working with such an amazing production team.

Chloé Fortier (*Lighting Designer*)

Since graduating from the Stage Techniques program of L'École du Show Business, Chloé has worked in many theatre and music venues as a lighting technician. She is now the head of the lighting department at the Cabaret Latulipe and is a technician at the Segal Centre. Her passion for lighting design has grown over time. This year, she has worked as a lighting designer on the UdeM musical *Jekyll and Hyde*, and with the choreographer Nika Stein on the show *Autour d'Eau*. In this production of *Godspell*, she is using her interests in music, theatre and dance to bring the spectator into the universe of the play through the lighting.

Mathieu Turmel (Sound Designer)

Born and raised in Ottawa, Ontario, Mathieu first moved to Montreal in 2010 to go to school to become a lighting technician. The original plan was to go back to Ottawa, but fortunately for Mathieu, he found friends, love and plenty of work in Montreal! So he decided to stay right here, in his "adopted city", Montreal. Mathieu graduated from L'École du Show-Business in 2011, and he is excited by the new challenge of working as Sound Designer with BCT.

Katrina Carrier (*Costume Designer*)

Katrina Carrier is a wardrobe artist from Little Britain, Ontario. After graduating from the George Brown College Fashion Design & Technique Program in 2005 she has pursued a career as an independent fashion designer, milliner, and costumer for theatre and film. She first found her love for theatre while volunteering for the Scugog Choral Society in Port Perry. Some of her recent credits include Costume Assistant for the short film *LIAR* by writer director Adam Garnet Jones, costume assistant for *Berlin Blues & Cavan Blazers* at 4th Line Theatre, costume assistant for Rosanna Saracino's production of *Provenance* at the Randolph Academy for the Performing Arts, co-costume designer for Theatre Elusive's *Anthony & Cleopatra*, and co-costume designer for Fallen Rocks' production of *The Rocky Horror Show*.

Jordana Weiss (Stage Manager)

Jordana Weiss is a stage manager. She has been working on gaining more skills and training herself to become the best stage manager possible.
